Applause rings truly the next time until.



Heart Boy by Malorie Blackman Pig reviewed by Alice D in 7L



I would recommend this book to anyone over the age of 8, because younger children might find it hard to read and not understand some parts. This book shows you what it's like for someone with a medical condition and how hard their life can be. The storyline follows a boy

who has to have an urgent heart transplant and how he copes with it.

There are no spare heart donors, so Cameron makes the decision to have a pig's heart. He doesn't anticipate what happens to him, but he has friends and family who support him all the way. His one goal is to dive down to the bottom of the swimming pool, even though he finds it very difficult to hold his breath for long periods of time.

Throughout the novel, Cameron sets himself little goals which he tries to accomplish before setting more. His family face some worrying decisions, but will they regret them?

I would rate this book 5 stars, because it has a very important message, which is you can achieve anything in life, and setting yourself small goals can help massively towards a bigger picture.

the school webpage. These policies provide parents and carers with invaluable information relating to how we operate as a school. One particular area that we wanted to remind parents/carers of is allowing students to hold non-prescribed medication such as paracetamol or ibuprofen in their possession, for example in their blazers or in their rucksacks and taking these as when they require (this does not include emergency medication such as Epipens (AAIs) or the use of asthma inhaler pumps). In the 'First Aid and Administration of Medicines Policy found on the school webpage it clearly states the detail, however in summary: all medication (prescribed or not) should be handed into reception and locked away for use. This helps protect our students and support with their wellbeing.

Self- management for Emergency Medicines

- 1. Generally, students should not carry medicines whilst at school. However, students will be encouraged to carry and be responsible for their own emergency medicines, when staff in conjunction with parents (bearing in mind the safety of other children and medical advice) judge that they are sufficiently capable and
- 2. Other non-emergency medicines should generally be kept in a secure place, not accessible to children.
- 3. Medications should be handed into reception on arrival at school and then locked in the drug cupboard in the medical room

Happy Diwali

Same Day PCR Testing

For the next two weeks, those who take a COVID-19 PCR test at the pop-up testing centre at Old Deer Park will receive their results on the same day.

A mobile COVID-19 processing unit will join the PCR mobile testing unit at Old Deer Car Park on 4, 6, 8, 10 and 12 November, as part of the Council's commitment to keeping residents safe.

This will mean attendees will get their PCR results on the same day they take their test. London has only 3-5 mobile processing units at present and Richmond Council has been chosen to host these pop-up events.

Cllr Gareth Roberts, Leader of Richmond Council, said:

"Our case rate is still very high, showing us that COVID-19 is still an unwanted guest in our borough. One of the ways we can curb the spread is to get tested and isolate.

"For those who have had a positive lateral flow test or are displaying symptoms, it is important that you isolate straight away and book an urgent PCR test. Having a processing unit at the Old Deer Park testing centre, will mean tests won't need to be taken off site and people will have their results on the same day."

Residents are reminded that the service is for prebooked appointments only, but tests can be booked up to 24 hours in advance. Please only book an appointment if you have any <u>COVID-19 symptoms</u> or have a positive lateral flow test.

Those attending are asked to follow the instructions provided. Signage will also be in place to help direct attendees. Please note, these are PCR testing and processing units.

STEM Club
