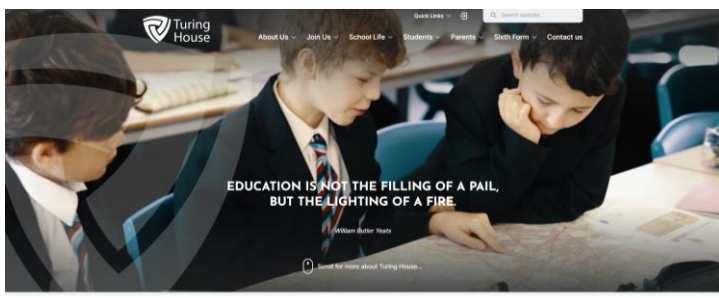


## Message from Mr O'Sullivan

Trainbow, the Intercity Express Train specially designed to celebrate the LGBTQ+ community, made its first journey on 7 June 2018. It was named after Alan Turing, one of our 100 Great Westerners.

*The Phantom Paint Pot* by William SJ-S

William's debut novel *The Phantom Paint Pot* is a short story, based in 1920s New York around a haunted art shop. Its creepy plot gave me the chills throughout and it surpassed my high expectations.



The way the book is designed and the images in it are also very unique and add to the story.

Turing, born in London, was responsible for the breaking of German ciphers in World War Two.

He was convicted for his sexuality in 1952 and received a posthumous pardon in 2013, when the "Turing Law" was passed to pardon all gay men convicted in the past.

Trainbow was named in Alan Turing's honour on Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> May at Paddington Station. "Naming Trainbow after Alan Turing is the most fitting tribute to one of our most recognised Great Westerners".

This is a double celebration of both the LGBTQ+ community and the 75th Anniversary of VE Day, with Turing being instrumental in the war effort.
