# GCSE History – Top Tips from Year 11

Our outgoing Year 11 students wanted to let our Year 9 students know their top tips as they begin to study GCSE History. We hope you find them useful!

Make flashcards each week for the topics you learn. It will mean that by the end of Year 10 you will have all the topics on flashcards that you memorise, leaving you more time to do practice questions.

Enjoy the experience. The content is incredible and even though you have exams, you'll have more knowledge about something than if you chose not to do History.

Focus on lessons and practise exam technique.

Make sure you understand the topics instead of trying to revise something you don't know.

Do not worry about events independently, but as part of a chain. If you know how events link together, it will be easier for you to map them and construct an answer rather than trying to remember a list of dates.

Make sure you understand the content in class instead of trying to revise on your own. It is so much easier just to listen in lesson, than try to learn something from scratch, because it doesn't stick.

Make sure to get a baseline knowledge of the subjects being studied by doing your own research beforehand.

Split each topic up in key areas and dates. This will really help you to remember what happens when rather than seeing it as one whole time period.

# Year 10 Spanish

Year 10 Spanish students have been busy preparing for their practice GCSE speaking exam coming up on the 12th and 13th July.



They have to learn a one-minute speech and prepare for the remaining 2 components: role play card and photo. Top tips: record yourself saying your speech and listen to it again and again; get someone at home to listen to you saying it out loud.

# Top Tips for those doing A Level History!

Year 13 students wanted to share some top tips for those beginning A-Level History too:

- It'll be difficult, and you may not feel like you're doing well, but in my experience, the only way to do better is to relax and focus on your strengths rather than focusing on how someone else in your class is approaching their essays (even if they're doing better than you) as everyone is different.
- Start revising early and read around the subject.
- Practise forming a strong argument within your essays.
- Be pro-active with work from the start of Year 12. When writing essays, keep them stored somewhere with plans and feedback so when you need to revisit them for revision, you're saving yourself from needing to write out all your plans again.
- Play an active role in learning and revision because the teachers only help you as much as you want to be helped.
- Consistently revise and make sure that you focus on weaker topics even if it may be difficult.
- Experiment with different methods of learning e.g. Visual tasks (story boards) or note taking (Cornell notes or mind-mapping) and revision (practice questions, flashcards, mind maps, explaining to other people) to see what works for you, it won't be the same for everyone
- Don't be discouraged if exam technique isn't perfect at first or if you are finding some of the topics difficult; you will improve. Just keep practising and taking on board feedback!


# Year 9/10 Girls Rounders v Hampton High

# Free History Day Out: Marble Hill House

A must see for all historians!

A day out at Marble Hill is a real treat as this beautiful Palladian villa is set in 66 acres of outstanding riverside parkland near Richmond in West London. The Marble Hill Revived project is complete and the house is open to explore from Wednesday to Sunday. Visitors can discover a taste of Georgian life through the freshly conserved interiors and interpretation.

Marble Hill was built for Henrietta Howard, Countess of Suffolk, a remarkable woman of letters and friend of some of England's greatest writers. The house and gardens were planned by fashionable connoisseurs, including the poet Alexander Pope, and were intended as an Arcadian retreat from crowded 18th-century London. There can be few places in England that better evoke the atmosphere of Georgian fashionable life.

Explore the beautiful parkland and take in the idyllic landscape on a picnic or dog walk with family and friends.

You don't need to book your free ticket in advance for the house at Marble Hill, but you will guarantee entry by booking online ahead of your visit.
