# Headteacher's message

discuss the impact of the new president on the UK. Often, it is presumed that children are not interested politics, but my experience couldn't be further from the truth.





# **Black History Month**

This year's theme for Black History Month was "Reclaiming Narratives." In the History Department, we believe that Black history should not be confined to a single month; it's an integral part of our curriculum, and we engage with it throughout the year to address historical inaccuracies and celebrate Black contributions. However, we also see Black History Month as a special opportunity to embrace a culture of education and empowerment.



The theme, "Reclaiming Narratives," encourages us to highlight and celebrate Black excellence in all its formswhether in the arts, sciences, politics, or everyday life. To honour




Additionally, students from all key stages were invited to participate in creative activities. They had the option to write about what "Reclaiming Narratives" means to them, create posters, tell the story of a
