





A Message from Mr O'Sullivan

Over the years I have been privileged to meet survivors that have come to various schools to speak to students about their experiences. What this has taught me with any genocide, natural disaster or event in which lots of people lose their lives is that the dots must always be made to stand out and remembered as people, individuals with lives back stories and families. If they are always viewed as statistics, nothing will be ever learn from the mistakes of history and we need to ensure we don't let them happen again. To give an example of this, at a previous school whilst in the role of Head of Religious Studies I met the wonderful Bettina Le Beau. During the Second World War, Le Beau was separated from her parents and was held in a concentration camp in southern France. Le Beau escaped and was helped by a family who hid her from the Nazis. Le Beau went to Britain in 1945 She worked as a model, graphologist and cabaret artist and learned several languages.

As an actress her television appearances include: The Benny Hill Show, Mrs Thursday, The Prisoner, Call My Bluff and The Golden Shot. Film appearances include My Last Duchess, San Ferry Ann, The Devil's Daffodil

and an uncredited role as Professor Dent's secretary in the first James Bond film, Dr. No. On radio, Le Beau was a regular on the BBC World Service programme Animal, Vegetable, Mineral?



Le Beau worked on a programme for women on radio and wrote a book entitled Help Yourself to Happiness and also lectured on her experience of The Holocaust. Resilience is always key. Le Beau is just one of the hundreds of thousands who survived Nazi persecution and who need to be remembered as much as those who sadly lost their lives. Throughout the school this week in our marking of Holocaust Remembrance Day, we honoured those who experienced the Holocaust, and all the family and friends connected with those people, and lives that continue to be affected by it.

History Club

Here is an article written by some students in KS3 History club about Holocaust Memorial Day, which was on Monday.

Holocaust Memorial Day is the day commemorating the victims of the Holocaust. The Holocaust was the genocide, primarily of European Jews, as well as other groups like the Romani, Slavs, disabled people, political opponents among other minority groups. Holocaust Memorial Day is held every year on January 27th, the date of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp and 2025 was the 80th anniversary of this liberation. Survivors spoke to world leaders to warn against the danger of rising antisemitism around the globe.

To mark Holocaust Memorial Day this year, we had an assembly held by our history teachers and some sixth formers. The message of the assembly was to learn about what has happened in the past so that we are equipped to combat rising hate and discrimination. The sixth formers spoke about their experiences, having visited Auschwitz-Birkenau, telling us about everything that they had seen and learned. They spoke about what the prisoners' experience was like from the moment they disembarked the trains, through to the rest of their experience of the camps, however long that may have been. The overall message was that it is everyone's responsibility to prevent atrocities happening at the earliest point possible, and by knowing what could happen, we better understand why it is so important to act.



At Turing House School, we learn about the causes and events of genocides. We learn the Holocaust, as well as other genocides that have happened since, such as the Rwandan, Bosnian and Cambodian genocides. The reason it is important to learn about genocides that have happened in the past is because if people are educated about them, it lowers the chance of those atrocities from happening again.
