## A Message from Mr O'Sullivan

(No Spoilers) Over recent days I have been inundated with friends and work colleagues contacting me about the Netflix programme, Adolescence. The series follows the harrowing story of a family whose world is turned upside down when their 13-year-old son, Jamie Miller, is arrested for the murder of a female classmate. The narrative unfolds in real-time, with each episode filmed in one continuous shot. As the investigation progresses, the series delves into the pressures faced by young men from their peers, the internet, and social media. Firstly, I cannot but praise the acting from the cast in Episodes 1,3 &4, this will surely win multiple awards. Episode 2 was frustrating on many levels. The portrayal of incompetent, aggressive teachers, a 10 second fire drill with no register taken, staff breaking GDPR regulations and the general sense of anarchy did not sit well with me. I can assure you as one Sixth Form student has said to me already, it wasn't Turing House.





The storyline is incredibly gripping and raises a stark message to all parents everywhere that we must become more aware of the lives our children lead online, the people they engage with and the messages they receive. The co-writer and one of the leads, Stephen Graham, issues a warning to parents in an article in The Independent:

"It's just being mindful of the fact that not only we parent our children, and not only the school educates our children," he said. "But also there's influences that we have no idea of that are having profound effects on our young culture, profound effects, positive and extremely negative. So it's having a look at that and seeing that we're all accountable."

I would encourage all our families to watch the programme. Mrs Collins and her EDIT group are already looking for ways to help parents understand and support their children, to stop adults 'bumbling about' (direct quote from the film, thanks Darcey). For example, with an understanding of how young people use emojis.
